Focus 40: Extreme Living


Forty days have been set aside for an emphasis on prayer and fasting in the life of the Church of God, leading up to Easter 2014.

Pendleton honors retiring Pastor Rick Oliver

Pastor Rick Oliver, of the Church of God in Pendleton, Oregon, celebrated his retirement January 26, 2014—just 28 years after his first Pendleton sermon on January 26, 1989.

“I’d like to think of it as ‘retooling’ rather than ‘retiring,’” says Oliver, who wants to continue investing his life to do something of significance.

Although Pendleton had many pastors over the years (beginning with Jim Dougherty in 1953), it has been Rick Oliver’s only senior pastorate position. He served as Youth Pastor in Oceanside, CA, from 1979-81 and at South Bay COG in Torrance, CA, from 1982-86.

Pastor Rick has served as hospital

chaplain for the past ten years, and continues in that role, along with some part-time Hospice work at St. Anthony’s Hospital in Pendleton. His wife, Debbie, continues to teach 4th grade in the community.

“After 35 years of weekend commitments, and now all of sudden you don’t have that—it’s a little bit different,” says Oliver.

Some of the other Pendleton pastors included Brother Mercer, Frost Hatch, Dick Hubacek, Emmett Hofer Ward Rogers, Carl Riley and Harold Davidson.

The congregation held a “going away dinner” for the Olivers, who were surprised with lots of out-of-town guests as well. Rick had the



privilege of dedicating his grandson, Jace Richard Oliver, to the Lord on the same Sunday of the celebration. Rick anticipates good things for the congregation and is grateful for the privilege of serving the Lord.

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CHOG Convention 2014 Host Church: From Humble Beginnings to Global Impact

For the first time in more than a century, the Church of God Convention and General Assembly will take place outside of Anderson, Indiana. For more than a hundred years, Church of God people from across the country and around the world grew quite familiar with the venues of the Anderson University campus, the Church of God Ministry center, Park Place Church of God, and the spread of dining options along the main drag. Church of God people from all over the world know the stories of the Gospel Trumpet Company, how a Bible training school grew into a university, and the impact of pillars of the faith, people such as Reardon and Oldham. But do you know the story of the church that will host the Church of God Convention this year?



Crossings Community Church began like so many Church of God congregations in the United States. In 1959, a congregation named Westridge Hills began holding services and preaching the gospel to all who would hear it. In 1981, a young fellow by the name of Marty Grubbs joined the church's staff as an associate pastor of youth and music. By 1985, Grubbs became the senior pastor, and the dynamic story of transformation began.

"There are several factors that paved the way for the growth of our church," Grubbs recollects. "We were a very small church of 150 people, in a very small and aging building, buried in a neighborhood and out of view of any major traffic pattern. In other words, we had no visibility of any kind. We jokingly referred to our motto of, 'If you can find us, you can join us!'"

It's a story many churches are familiar with. Some are simply off the beaten path, while others are tucked behind industrial establishments or nestled deep within dense subdivisions. But that *invisibility* soon became *visibility* when a certain segment of the church rallied together around Christ with the goal of

I have a friend who became a US citizen recently. In fact, during our recent ice storm, when most of us were avoiding the roads at all cost, he drove 120 miles to keep the appointment for his test and interview. I might have assumed the office would be closed, or at least would have called to reschedule, but he wasn't going to take anything for granted. He showed up at 7:45, and even though the office opened 2 ½

hours late, he waited until someone showed up.

His life has absolutely changed. Next time he goes to visit his parents in China, he will have to apply for a Visa. He is no longer claimed by the nation where he was born. I know it was an agonizing decision for him. His life, and identity, will never be the same, and he cannot undo the change that he has made. He made the decision he did, be-

cause the benefits of changing outweighed the benefits of staying the same.

We (the church) are having to consider changes that are just as monumental. Most of our churches are shrinking and aging. Recent surveys have shown that while people in the general populace still have a favorable impression of Jesus, they do not trust,

making a difference in the community. When members of the community paid a visit to the neighborhood church, their needs were made first priority. All the while, Pastor Grubbs listened intently to the congregation's dreams to make a difference.

"I began preaching sermons aimed at non-Christians," Grubbs explains, "aimed squarely at the people who were not in the church, and the visitors who were coming through our door. Our people began inviting their friends, we advertised the sermon series in local media, and we personally invited the neighborhood, about three hundred homes." But the sermons focused on the community were not the only thing receiving attention. "We were in a neighborhood where there was great pride in the homes and their yards. Grass was green and flowers were everywhere. Except on our property." So in 1986, Grubbs bought a bag of fertilizer and planted some flowers. The neighbors took notice and were very happy.

Pastor Grubbs also shared with the congregation stories and insights from churches who were experiencing success. Excitement increased as the church realized that they, too, could do the kind of ministry larger churches were doing. Grubbs helped lead the church to emphasize those things the church did well, including things unique to themselves.

In 1999, the church saw 3,100 people gather for worship at the new Crossings Church. Since then, among many other incredible events, the church has launched a Hispanic church, started a Christian school, and opened a community medical clinic. Today, Crossings Church gives God glory for a body of between five and six thousand worshipers. Their impact stretches from the city rescue mission to North Korea, from local schools to the streets of Lebanon.

"I have always believed we were a very compelling demonstration of the original idea for the Church of

God," Grubbs reflects. "As we saw the culture becoming disenchanted with the mainline denominations, we were able to offer an affiliation with a wonderful group called the Church of God. When we told people there was no formal membership, but that joining the body was all about turning your life over to Christ, this message was widely valued and appreciated. In essence, we were conservative in theology but liberal in love. We have not shied away from telling the story of our Church of God roots. It is the first thing we tell newcomer classes today. They appreciate the anchor and accountability we have as a Church of God congregation, and they love the emphasis on Christ and not a denomination."



When Church of God pastors, leaders, and laypeople convene this summer in Oklahoma City to worship and speak into the direction of the movement, they will no doubt be welcomed by smiling faces and joyful hearts. "I want people to know that our volunteers are ready to serve them," Grubbs explains. "These volunteers are people from all walks of life, with stories of deep pain and hurt before they found Christ, and amazing stories of all that has happened to them since giving their lives to Christ... We look forward to serving those who arrive on our campus. We are one. We are family, and we are thrilled that we get to meet a large contingent of the rest of the family."

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nor really like, the church. That not only sheds light on how the people around us perceive the church, it also shows that many people do not connect the church with Jesus.

That's frightening and convicting.

We're at a place where the reasons to change greatly outweigh the reasons to stay the same. That would motivate most people, or organizations, to change. However, a large chunk of the consequences we'll face by not changing will be borne not by us but by the generations that follow us.

Many of us are old enough that the churches we've grown to love will hang around long enough for us to enjoy them for the remainder of our lives. They may shrink and decline, but there is a chance that something we are comfortable with will still be around for us.

I guess we have that option; hang on as long as we can and let the next generation figure out how to change.

But somehow I don't think that is what it means to be the church. Throughout the church's history, believers have had to figure out what it means to be Jesus in their generation. Those of us who have gray highlights owe that not only to those in the world around us, we also owe it to those in the faith who are following behind us.



We can't do it by going about business as usual. We can't do it by ourselves. We can't do it by minimizing risk or ignoring tough issues and questions. We can only do it by sitting down together, our eyes turned to the scripture and to those around us for whom Christ died, and our ears tuned to each other and the voice of the Holy Spirit.

We began such a conversation with Michael Kimpan from the Marin foundation at the How-To Convention. It was a difficult conversation and an uncomfortable one for many of us. But it was a start. But only a start.
