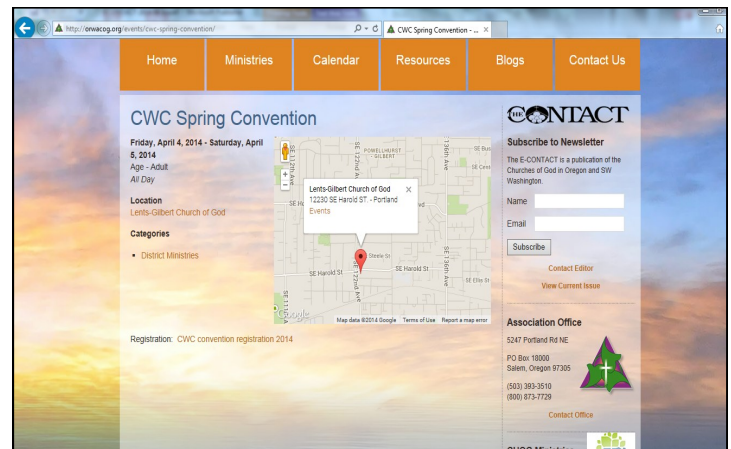

Church of God Ministries Publishing Merges with Warner Press

At the beginning of January, the publishing work of Church of God Ministries in Anderson, Indiana, was reintegrated into its subsidiary, Warner Press, Inc. This ends a fifteen-year period in which curriculum, books for the Church of God, and hymnals have been produced by Church of God Ministries and distributed under the Warner Press brand.

“Warner Press was established in 1880 as the publishing house of the Church of God,” says Warner president Eric King. “With this step, Warner Press again truly becomes the official publishing house of the church. All of the duties, responsibilities and decisions pertaining to this area are again consolidated within the Warner Press organization.” Warner Press continues to have a significant role in the Christian retail market as a producer of church supplies, children’s books, and ministry resources.

King also announced that Warner Press has repaid all long-term debt incurred in a major restructuring of the company in 1999. He called this a “genuine success story” for the church.

Editorial staff who worked at Church of God Ministries have now joined the Warner Press team. Joe Allison, who served for the past nine years as coordinator of publishing at the national offices of the Church of God, is now editorial director of curriculum and discipleship resources for Warner Press.

“From the movement’s birth, the publishing house of the Church of God has been a core component of ministry,” explains Jim Lyon, general director of Church of God Ministries. “Church of God Ministries is committed to working as a team with Warner Press, developing content and product lines that advance the kingdom on every front where the Church of God stands—and for the larger body of Christ, as well. To this end, we are excited about not just a

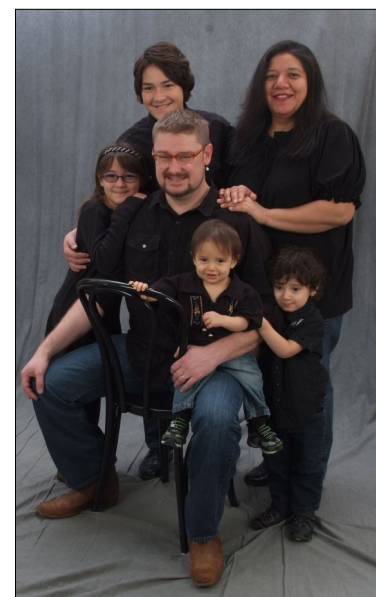

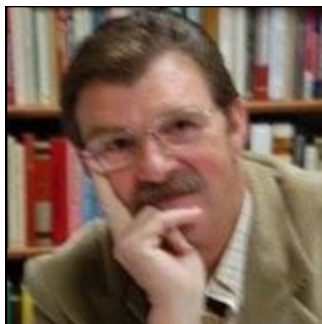
WARM Registration Deadline Approaches

There is still time to register for the Western Area Regional Ministerium (WARM) to be held at Lynchwood Church of God in Portland, OR. Late fees will be charged after April 13 for the event which takes place April 29-May 1, 2014.

The theme, *“Yesterday, Today and Forever: Being the Body of Christ”* is based on Hebrews 11, presented by a trio of dynamic speakers.



Dr. Merle Strege, Church Historian, will appropriately address “Yesterday” during the event. Well known in the Portland area, Dr. Strege taught at Warner Pacific College before joining the faculty of Anderson University, where he serves as professor of historical theology in the Religious Studies Department. Strege has written numerous books on the Church of God (Anderson) and contributed to others. He recently served with Michael Cartwright as editor of *Called to Unite Knowledge & Vital Piety: Indiana’s Wesleyan-Related Universities* (2011). Strege is currently researching and writing the centennial history of Anderson University. He teaches courses in Church of God history for the School



of Theology and oversees denominational studies courses.

Dr. Leonard Sweet is a scholar of US American culture; a semiotician who “sees



things the rest of us do not see, and dreams possibilities that are beyond most of our imagining”; and a preacher and best-selling author who communicates the gospel with a signature bridging of the worlds of faith, academe, and popular culture. Currently the E. Stanley Jones Professor of Evangelism at Drew University, Madison, NJ, and a Visiting Distinguished Professor at George Fox University, Portland, Oregon, Dr. Sweet brings a Wesleyan perspective and unique challenge as he addresses “Today”.

Tackling “Forever”, is General Director of the Church of God, **Dr. Jim Lyon**.

A visionary and gifted communicator, Jim is passionate about Jesus and the church. As Jim often says, “Jesus is the subject!” Lyon grew up in Seattle, where he served as an Associate and then Senior Pastor of the Fairview Church (1977-1991). Since 1991 until recently, he served as Senior Pastor of the Madison Park Church of God in Anderson, Indiana, in the Indianapolis metro.



Lyon studied at Seattle Pacific University and the University of Washington Law School, before taking a post at Northwest Airlines, in Seattle. Always fascinated by politics and the public interest, he has worked in many civic and church-related fields; he once represented NW Seattle as a member of the Washington State House of Representatives in the early 1980’s.

But it is the Christian ministry that ultimately owned his heart. It is the conviction that Jesus is at work in this world, redeeming and transforming us, that has molded his life and vocation more than any other. Articulate pastor, teacher, and motivational speaker, he became the host of *CBH Viewpoint*, the weekly English broadcast of *Christians Broadcasting Hope* (the radio ministry of the Church of God based in Anderson, Indiana), heard internationally on several continents.

In 2011, Jim released his first book, *Go Ahead, Ask Anything*, published by Stylos and distributed by Word.

Based on a sermon series at the Madison Park Church, the book addresses the top ten questions posed in a community survey asking, “If you could ask anything at church, what would it be?”

A Refreshing Relationship

One Sunday morning in 1954, in Yokosuka, Japan. I saw a small building with a cross displayed. As I came closer I recognized the music, although it was played in an unfamiliar style. I didn't know the language, but I was drawn by the message of "My Jesus, I Love Thee, I know Thou art Mine". I entered and sat on the back pew. Soon a young lady came and sat beside me and greeted me in English. She stood and said something to the pastor. Through the interpreter, the pastor said, "Welcome to the American Sailor." It was at this point that I experienced Christian Unity. The congregation stood, turned and faced me and greeted me with a smile and the traditional Japanese bowing of the head. I was embarrassed, but I knew I was "home." I never learned what denominational label identified the congregation, but I felt connected to The Body.

Christian Unity was one of the foundational doctrines in which the

Church of God Reformation Movement took root nearly 130 years ago. In order to maintain unity, connectivity and identity within the ranks of our movement, we must work at eliminating and rejecting those things that have the potential to divide.

We cherish our freedom from man-made creed and the opportunity that we have to pursue our pilgrimage in accordance with our own relationship with Christ. Sometimes, this leads to situations that are divisive, such as an unhealthy sense of autonomy and independence.

If Jesus, and the early church leaders gave us any universal message in addition to that of salvation, it is that we are all connected in The Body, and as responsible members thereof, we are each accountable to the other. This

holds true for individuals, congregations and larger cooperative entities. If we could somehow catch the magnitude of Paul's message of how The Body, directed by the Holy Spirit, works cooperatively and in a supporting manner, we just might be, as was C.S. Lewis, "surprised by joy." This is nowhere more vivid than in personal and congregational support of the financial needs of the church's ministry.

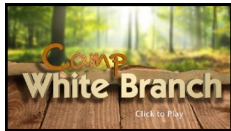
In this connected relationship there is a refreshing vitality, transforming nurture, and the fulfillment of the prayer of Jesus. (John 17:21).

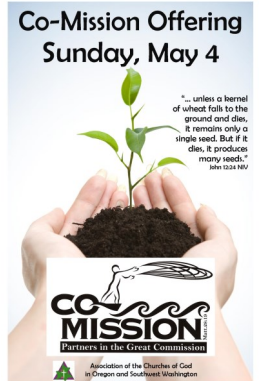

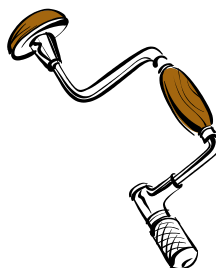
