A Pastoral Letter from Jim Lyon, General Director

February 18, 2015

Everyone knows that the world is changing exponentially all around us. Ministry models once thought as fixed in time are being adapted, and made more flexible, to most effectively advance the kingdom. Local churches, universities and colleges, church agencies, and the secular businesses that employ so many members of the Church of God family from coast to coast, have all been challenged by the fluid environment in which we serve.

Church of God Ministries (base camp) is working hard to be the best it can be—the best steward of kingdom resources it can be, the best instrument in God's hands it can be—and to serve and expand the kingdom interest in the best ways possible. It is committed to the unchanging truths of the gospel which gave the Movement birth, even as it (like the first generation of the Movement) proves to be at-once nimble, sure-footed, and flexible in the pursuit of heaven's ends.

In the last few months, the Church of God Ministries executive staff have been hard at work reviewing our present footprint, and seeking the Lord's leading for the future. In consultation with key voices in the building, and in the Movement outside of the Anderson base camp, the team has sought to wrestle with our challenges and opportunities for best outcomes. Church of God Ministries faces some tall financial mountains to climb, including major maintenance of our base camp building. Simultaneously, new horizons of ministry and kingdom expansion wait clearly within our grasp.

Many of our sister ministries are outsourcing basic services (like information technology and communications) for which we have supported extensive full-time staff. Advancing technology and office practice have enabled us to better steward our resources. Overhead at the base camp has consumed resources that might otherwise be invested in the field.

And so, the difficult decision has been made to reduce our workforce. This decision is not being taken just for the bottom line, but in the kingdom interest, maximizing resources to expand the ministry across the board. At the same time, it requires the departure of some wonderful folks who have faithfully invested many years with us. We cannot continue as we are, but it is very painful to let go of friends who have long been a part of our base camp family.

We respect and value each one. We have worked (against the counsel of many in business) to minimize the impact, insofar as we are able, on those we have asked to step aside. On Monday and Tuesday, we informed each one whose role on our team is being ended. We have offered each one the chance to work through the end of February, and then receive two more months of pay and OR CHURCH OF GOD

insurance. They have been also given other options to consider in choosing their date of departure. But, in each case, the decision is theirs to make, as we want to honor their service with us.

It's never easy to cross a bridge like this one. Still, some bridges must be crossed.

Since the fall of 2013, twenty-six members of our ministry team have stepped away (due to retirement, finding calls to serve elsewhere, or other reductions in force); seven new members of the team have, in that time, been hired. By the end of April, we will see a 29 percentsmaller base camp staff, with nineteen fewer in-house. But, we will also see an expanding portfolio of services and efficiency. Again, we are committed to being the best we can be, the most loving we can be, and the best stewards we can be.

These reductions in force do not represent a contraction of Church of God Ministries, but rather the development of a stable and growing platform with which to change the world and serve the larger church. Thanks for praying with us. Thanks for understanding.

In this, as in all things, we strive to make Jesus the subject. And, we believe he is walking with those who will now find new chapters of employment elsewhere, as well as those who remain.

guest speaker for the weekend. Janelle recently completed her Bachelor's degree through Warner University's online school.


Originally from Missouri, Janelle met and married her husband Tim, while attending Anderson College in Indiana. They currently serve the Aloha Church of God.



Contact your district/ conference/ association office for a discount code. From 1979-1981, Pastor Wayne Schmidt helped plant Kentwood Community Church (KCC), becoming senior pastor in 1981. Over the years KCC developed into one of the flagship churches in the Wesleyan denomination, becoming increasingly multiethnic as it reached the increasingly diverse greater Grand Rapids, MI. KCC grew to more than 2,600 attendees each weekend while planting 10 other churches with many unique approaches to ministry.

- Dr. Schmidt has addressed churches and conferences around the globe and in nearly every district of The Wesleyan Church. He has served as a General Conference delegate four times and has worked closely with the Department of Evangelism & Church Growth in strategy development and vision casting for the promotion of church planting, parenting and health.
- He has taught as an adjunct professor at Indiana Wesleyan University (IWU) and Bethany Bible College (now Kingswood University). In January of 2010 he became the first Vice-President for the newly formed Wesley Seminary at IWU, providing strategic and operational leadership in shaping a revolutionary way

MILDRED RUTH MAXFIELD, 10/16/1919-1/26/2015

Mildred Maxfield, 95, died on Monday, January 26, 2015, at Canterbury Park in Longview, Washington. She was born October 16, 1919, to



Henry and Freda Bettger in Flattop, Wyoming. After growing up in Greeley, Colorado, Mildred attended Gordon Bible College in Gordon, Nebraska, where she met her future husband, Rev. Leland C. Maxfield.

Leland and Mildred were married in 1940. Together, they celebrated over 60 years of ministry in the Church of God (Anderson, IN). They pastored together in Greeley, CO; Delta, CO; Albion, NE; Baker, OR,; Sunnyside, WA; and Rainier, OR.

Mildred served for five years as a private kindergarten teacher in Rainier, and later worked for a number of years in the Rainier School District as a special education teacher aide, from which she retired.

Mildred was a long-time member of Rainier Community Church of God in Rainier, Oregon. Her faith guided her life, and her family was always her first priority.

She is preceded in death by her husband, Leland; her parents, Henry and Freda Bettger; and her four brothers: Ronald, Harold, Paul, and Edwin.

Mildred is survived by her children and their spouses: Adah and George

Butz, Santa Margarita, CA; Bernadine and Howard Butz, Rainier, OR; and Paul and Brenda Maxfield, Anderson, IN; seven grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren.

Mildred was committed to the ministry of Children of Promise, the Church of God child sponsorship ministry, serving children in need in 27 countries.

As a volunteer, she made over 100,000 salvation bracelets used by Children of Promise volunteers around the world to share the love of God.

That said, don't be surprised if you are trekking through the wilds of Africa, and you come across a gaggle of kids all sporting thin, faded bracelets, some with loose threads, some with pearls missing, but all still carrying a special dose of God's love.

MURIEL LAROSE (ANDERSON) MARBLE 8/10/1926-2/17/2015



Born in Bellingham, Washington, Muriel spent her elementary years in Portland and Washington County, Oregon, and later in Stevenson, Washington where her father worked dredging the Columbia River for the highway construction and Bonneville Dam. Muriel graduated as valedictorian from Forest Grove Union High School in 1943, at16.

Following graduation Muriel worked as a sweeper in the Albina Shipyards in Portland, where ships were built for WWII. During that summer she met Ivan Marble, an energetic young man from New York who had delivered her aunt's car from Indiana. Turning down a scholarship to Oregon State University, Muriel attended Pacific Bible College (now Warner Pacific College) in Portland along with Ivan. They married, June 2, 1944, and both worked in the shipyards to pay for attendance at PBC. Their education was placed on hold when their jobs ended after the end of the war in Europe in the spring of 1945. Two days prior to Mother's Day in May of that year they welcomed Fred, their first of 9 children (7 boys and twin girls).

Ivan continued to work as a carpenter and Muriel as a homemaker. They lived in Aloha for a short time and then moved to Cornelius, Oregon, where Ivan pastored the Banks Methodist Church for approximately 2-1/2 years, In 1952 they established the Gales Creek Community Church of God, where Ivan served as pastor for 4-1/2 years. They lived in the Gales Creek area until moving to Forest Grove in 1961.

Active in the community, Muriel was involved in the school parent-teacher organization, a Den Leader for Cub Scouts, and taught and managed Sunday School. She was active in the League of Women's Voters, reported the Gales Creek news for the Forest Grove News Times, and always opened her home to others. In 1974 she became an aide for the Forest Grove School District at Neil Armstrong Junior High School, where she worked until she retired in 1988. After Ivan's death in 1995 Muriel became a licensed minister in the Church of God and served the Gales Creek Church and the Valley Hope Church in Hillsboro, also performing weddings and funerals within the community.

Muriel was preceded in death by her parents, Bernt and Rosa (Beardslee) Anderson, her husband, Rev. Ivan Marble, her brother Donald B. Anderson, and her daughter, Karen LaRose (Marble) Delashmutt.

Muriel died peacefully on Tuesday morning, February 17, 2015 at Sweet Haven Adult Foster Home in Forest Grove. She is survived by seven sons: Fredrick I. (Carolyn) Marble of Forest Grove; Richard B. (Joanne) Marble of Dayton, WA; Stanley G. Marble of Lapwai, ID; William H. (Donna) Marble of Gales Creek; David H. (DeAnn) Marble of St. Helens; Charles F. (Anita) Marble of Forest Grove; Timothy J. Marble of Forest Grove; one daughter: Christine J. Marble of Forest Grove; 24 grandchildren and 35 great grandchildren.
