In his book *Small Church Essentials* Karl makes the point that 'small does not equal broken' and challenges us to throw away the idea that small is something to be fixed and that bigger is always

better. Karl reminds us that most, if not all of us will worship in and/or pastor a small church, and very few will ever pastor a large or mega church and that is okay! What we must do is learn the skills to pastor a thriving church of any size and that is what Karl will teach us how to do.

If you are tired of going to conferences led by mega-church pastors that get you excited only to be let down when you get home, you are not alone. As your district pastor, I understand, and that is why we are offering this conference. We value you and the effort you put in to lead your church every day and we want to equip you with some tools to help you thrive.

The local church is the main way Jesus chose to bring hope and love to the world. By "church" we don't mean denominations, buildings, organizations, sacraments or creeds. We believe the church is at its most profound and basic when it acts as an extension of Jesus' command to love God and love others.

People getting together to love Jesus, each other and the world is what the church looks like when it is stripped back to its essential core. Or, as Jesus put it, "when two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in the midst of them."

Megachurches are great! Not only do we have nothing against them, we believe the world needs more of them.

House Churches are great too! No one knows how many of them exist all over the world but, especially where the church is illegal, they are a vital spiritual lifeline for untold millions of believers. They deserve and need our prayer and support.

So, if megachurches and house churches are so wonderful, why is New Small Church all about the churches in between and what do we mean by "Small Church?"

Numerically, the boundaries between churches of each size are fairly fluid, but here's a guide:

House Church: Less than 25 (and meeting in a house), **Small Church:** 25 – 350 (or under 25 meeting in a church building), **Big Church:** 350 – 2,000, **Megachurch:** Over 2,000

WHY WE EXIST

Small Churches don't appeal to everyone. But, as it turns out, they do appeal to most people. More followers of Jesus have attended Small Churches in the last 2,000 years than any other type of church. That doesn't mean they're the best way to do church (we believe the "best" way is whatever works for the people who need it), but as the most popular type of church in existence, they need to receive more attention, support and encouragement than they typically have.

Small Churches make up 80% – 90% of the known churches in the world, but are the subject of probably less than 1% of the books and blogs about how to do church ministry. Small Churches are no better and no worse than churches of any other size. But they have been the most neglected, especially when it comes to pastoral training.

New Small Church wants to help fill that gap. We exist to encourage, connect and equip innovative Small church leaders. That's not just a slogan – it's what we actually plan to do. We want to see better, stronger, healthier Small Churches, led by passionate, prayerful, capable, innovative and loving pastors.

We believe being small is not a problem to fix, but a strategy God wants to use.

Most Small Church leaders have not been told that – or at least they haven't been told it enough. If we can help turn up the volume on that message, we will have done what we set out to do.



A Cry for PEACE ...



Every day, but especially today, our hearts cry out for peace. A constant barrage of disheartening and horrific headlines leave even the mostconnected and best-equipped among us feeling helpless, if not hopeless. We are reminded that "He's still got the whole world in his hands," yet that reality doesn't remove the pain, the loss, the suffering, and the tragedy. God's shalom is the only true antidote for a social landscape marred by violence and war, both physical and spiritual.

We therefore offer this "cry for peace" to our Lord whose heart also breaks for hurting ones in various locations, facing battles of differing types and intensity, across the globe. We share it with you, too, that you may join us on our knees.

As we continue to watch the unfolding conflict and violence in Israel and Palestine, we long for God's shalom. We pray that precious human lives be spared on all sides and that world leaders exercise divine wisdom through every engagement and response.

As we pray for peace in Israel and Palestine, may we also intercede for peace alongside our global Church of God family enduring the following five conflicts:

Ever since a military coup in early 2021, the people of Myanmar have suffered extensively under the brutal *junta* regime. Widespread acts of violence against civilians, economic inflation, and restrictions that limit gatherings continue to greatly challenge the life of the Church of God in Myanmar.



This summer, the Church of God in Mandalay, Myanmar, welcomed low-income families from their community to shelter at their church facilities after the junta military government

unexpectedly demolished 70 of their homes. Church of God Ministries (CGM) Disaster Relief partnered with the local body of believers in purchasing food, clothes, and school materials for the many children in their midst. They also walked with these families in securing new, safe housing options. Praise the Lord that each family has now been resettled through this ministry of hospitality and compassion!

In 2023, CGM Disaster Relief helped provide monthly stipends for the Church of God pastors and leaders in Myanmar. This small, yet significant provision equipped them to provide for their families and continue ministering to their church and community. As we draw near to the end of 2023, financial assistance under this brutal military regime is needed now more than ever; donations are needed to make this commitment possible.



In late 2022 and early 2023, conflict and violence in the wake of M23 rebels in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) forced many individuals—including hundreds of Church of God families—to flee their homes and seek refuge in other parts of the country. Many of these men, women, and children remain displaced. The Church of God in Goma, DRC continues to minister to 387 displaced Church of God families and seeks partnership in providing them posho, rice, oil, and sugar.

Church of God Disaster Relief

Since the assassination of Haiti's president on July 7, 2021, the nation has experienced incredible socioeconomic and political instability resulting in a state of anarchy controlled by various rival gangs. High degrees of violence and widespread economic fall-out have resulted in a dire humanitarian crisis, leaving millions in desperate need of relief. Current assessments estimate that nearly half of Haiti's 4.9 million people are regularly going hungry, and the nation's children face grave risk of malnutrition. The Church of God in central Haiti (where the situation is most



dire) is stepping up to provide nutrition, especially for the most vulnerable. Local pastors network together to identify and provide bean and rice provisions to families most in need. Likewise, the St. Ard school, connected with the local church, started a feeding program that serves a substantial meal to the 300 children enrolled. For many of these children, this is the only large meal they receive each day. The St. Ard Hospital in Haiti also continues to meet critical health needs in the surrounding communities. However, assistance is needed to continue these vital ministries.



The global Church of God remains in solidarity with our Ukrainian brothers and sisters despite the brutally enduring nature of this war. The Hungarian Church of God continues to make multiple relief trips into Ukraine each month—bringing food, clothes, and other basic necessities to internally displaced peoples (IDPs) who remain in Ukraine. Agape Ministries, as part of the Bulgarian Church of God, continues to offer Bulgarian language classes and professional counseling services to Ukrainian refugees in their community. CGM Disaster Relief also partners with

Kinderhilfswerk in Germany to stipend a Ukrainian pastor's salary and equip him to continue his ministry among the Ukrainian Church of God community now residing in Calw, Germany. Additionally, winter relief activities alongside the German and Hungarian Church of God are already underway- preparing now by purchasing generators, sleeping bags, and coats, as well as by installing solar panels and extra insulation in the walls of churches where IDPs are sheltering.

Christians in Jaranwala, Pakistan witnessed a distressing wave of attacks, lootings, and burnings, which rendered many families displaced and churches destroyed. Within one week of this news being shared with the Church of God movement, sufficient support was received to not only provide immediate assistance groceries, blankets, mattresses, sheets, and pillows—to 150 families—but also to equip the Pakistani Church of God to continue walking alongside the 20 Church of God families who lost everything in the flames. By the end of the year, these families will




see their homes renovated and refurbished; more than that, they will know that they are loved and prayed for by their global Church family.

To equip peace-filled responses through the local Church of God globally, gifts can be made to <u>Church of God</u> <u>Ministries Disaster Relief</u>. 100 percent of your donation goes to equip relief ministries in these five countries, as well as other Church of God communities affected by disaster globally. While there is no Church of God presence in Israel or Palestine, Church of God Ministries is exploring Christ-centered ministries to partner with on the ground.

Remembering Rev. Frank Yerden



Rev. Frank Yerden March 23, 1949 – August **7**, 2023

Frank Maurice Yerden was a beloved son, brother, faithful and devoted husband, father, pastor, mentor, and friend to many. Frank was well known for his friendly personality and his steady, laid back demeanor, his kindness, and his listening ear. Frank turned every willing stranger into a friend. He had a heart for the broken and found joy in meeting the needs of others. A recurring theme from those who knew him best is that there was never a time he spoke a bad word about anyone. Frank was an encourager, one who championed others in their gifts, and faithfully prayed for their best.

During his 53 years of church ministry, Frank often spoke of the importance of studying, memorizing, and meditating upon the Word of God and allowing the Word to influence every facet of one's life. Frank desired for everyone to experience the love of Jesus, striving himself to be like Jesus to those around him. Evidence of this desire was modeled in his character, but was also in the music that

Frank wrote, one of the most recognized of which is a simple chorus with this one phrase: "Let the people who live around me each day see Jesus in me."

An inspiring example of great faith in the midst of adversity, Frank battled Parkinson's Disease for 22 years until it finally claimed his last breath. As the disease slowly robbed him of motor skills and later basic functions, it was in 2019 that it impaired his speech, often leaving him unable to communicate with anyone but Jesus. Frank's amazing attitude during the last, most difficult years, of his life became a beautiful testimony to many. Though his disability stripped him from the functions of being a preacher, a worship leader, a counselor and friend to have conversation with — all things that he once considered to be a large part of his identity — he blessed his friends and family with the message that despite all he had lost, no one and no disease could take away his ability to pray. "It is the most fundamental ability and greatest gift of God we've been given as humans from the time we are born", he said to his daughter, Nicole, one day as he struggled to speak clearly over the phone. He then emphasized, "I can PRAY".

Frank was born March 23, 1949 to Maurice and Lenore Yerden of Allegan, Michigan. The family moved to Saginaw, Michigan where Frank spent his growing up years. Frank graduated from General Douglas MacArthur High School where he was a wrestling state champion, competed on the cross country team, and participated in the school choir. After high school, Frank attended Anderson College, in Anderson, Indiana where he met and married Ruth Ann Helbling in 1969. Transferring to Warner Pacific College, he and Ruth Ann answered the call to ministry in the state of Oregon, and then on to Southern California where Frank graduated from Azusa Pacific College, in 1978 with a degree in Music Theory and Composition.

The couple welcomed three daughters: Christina, Nicole, and Tiffany, who from a young age joined Frank and Ruth in ministry through music at their home churches, churches across the United States, and at camp meetings and similar events.

Frank began his role in church ministry at Friendly Street Church of God in Eugene, OR, where he served as the Minister of Music/Youth. At Inter-Community Church of God in Covina, CA, Frank served as Associate Pastor and Minister of Music. The Yerden Family ministered through World Gospel Crusades during their time in Southern California. From there, the Yerdens moved to Visalia, CA where Frank served as Associate Pastor/Minister of Music at the Church of God.

Frank was ordained as a minister of the Church of God in Visalia in 1981. He later served as senior pastor at the Church of God in Capitola, CA, as senior pastor in Chico, CA and as worship pastor at Vancouver Church, WA. He thoroughly enjoyed the excitement of the church's annual Singing Christmas Tree. After 7 years in Vancouver, Frank became the senior pastor at Holladay Park Church of God, Portland, OR and then in 2006, returned to the associate and music role at Rockwood Church of God in Gresham, OR where Frank served until his retirement 10 years later. Rockwood Church of God was the final and beloved church family who cared for Frank and Ruth in a way that only God Himself could have provided.

The name Frank means "Free", and he was truly set free and restored when he went to his heavenly home on August 7, 2023. He was preceded in death by his father Maurice Yerden, mother Lenore Yerden, and sister Kay Kruse. He is survived by his beloved and faithful spouse of 54 years Ruth Ann (Helbling) Yerden, their three daughters Christina Nail, Nicole Wells (spouse Steve), Tiffany Carlson (spouse Matt), and grandchildren Nicole (Nail) Clancy, Joshua Nail, Stephanie Nail, Chandler Wells, Landon Wells, Jonathan Nail, Isla Carlson, and great grandchildren Benjamin, Amelia, and Finley, and sister Connie Jensen.


The Awakening Series



The Church of God Worldwide ...

Historic and catalytic, the inaugural gathering of the Global Church of God Alliance (GCGA) this year proved providential in agenda, scope, and trajectory. Wielding singular aspiration to strengthen the bonds of the Church of God movement around the world for the advancement of the kingdom, representatives of the Church of God, otherwise separated by location and language, worshiped together, wrestled common challenges together, and wrought



framework together by which the Church of God can embrace its collective calling. Though the GCGA met on the heels of the <u>Church of God Convention in Tampa</u> four months ago, echoes of the event can still be heard. Several such echoes take on the timbre of insightful and inspirational recollections and reflections of those who were there.

Leaderwell Pohsngap hosted the conversation over two days of meetings in Tampa. For Leaderwell, home is Shillong, Meghalaya, India. But for Leaderwell, home can be anywhere the Church of God offers its signature warm and inviting hospitality. "It never dawned on me [before this gathering] that the Movement is in *so many* countries of the world," he reflects.

More than ninety countries, to be sure—one of which is Barbados. Lennox Boyce, representing the Church of God in Barbados, shares similar sentiment. "I will remember the camaraderie, unity, and sense of purpose that prevailed in the room," he recalls. "While there were differences in the process of establishing the Global Church of God Alliance, there certainly was unity of purpose in its necessity, Importance, and relevance.... One of the things I enjoyed most, apart from hearing such interesting reports from each region of the world, was getting to know my brothers and sisters from around the world."

Reports presented from each region of the world certainly connected listeners with fascinating statistics and captivating anecdotes summarizing the work of God outside the all-too-common confines of national communication. Part of what the GCGA will accomplish is the creation and continuation of communication (particularly in both English and Spanish, widely used across the globe—and therefore, also during the meetings of the GCGA). Without a doubt, God is still active in the whole world; testimony to that assertion tends to encourage both perseverance and affinity.

"Without a doubt," Esteban Zapata insists in Spanish, translated into English, "it's being able to share experiences with so many leaders from different continents, knowing what's going on with the Church of God in other parts of the world, and hearing about struggles and victories, which are similar to the ones in our region." Zapata, representative to the Global Church of God Alliance from Honduras, explains the vital next steps to stewarding such knowledge. "Being able to hear reports from different regions [means] having the opportunity to pray for one another."

In view of the worship, the dialogue, and the connections, Leaderwell suggests the best part of the event, though, was ultimately its simple purpose—"to launch it." In the early stages of development, the GCGA aims not to provide one more event on the calendar for international Christian fellowship. The GCGA, as Leaderwell sees it, exists so the Church of God globally can "encourage each other, pray for each other, and serve as a platform from which we can think of joint missional efforts with others in the Movement." He also points out the value of theological discussion concerning present-day issues confronting the Church of God in various contexts and cultures.

Lennox Boyce underscores this evident need for more than fellowship. "The world has become a very small place, and

we have much more in common than we know," he observes. "The devil has convinced people that it is more important to focus on what keeps us apart than what unites us. In the Church of God, we are looking for ways to unite. Global unity as a Movement is essential. Observing common trends and looking for ways to tackle them are necessary. Supporting each other with prayer and personnel is vital to the life and future of our existence. [Therefore,] cross-cultural ministry opportunities, which can develop from this Alliance, are important. We can do more together than we can do by ourselves."

For Cyril Pillay, from the Church of God in South Africa, the profoundly beautiful moments of worship and prayer during the Tampa gathering were especially memorable. Meeting Church of God leadership from across the globe was an even brighter highlight. But he maintains focus on what yet needs to be accomplished as the GCGA moves forward. "Strategic planning is a must," he asserts. While the Church of God presence in ninety-plus countries is encouraging, he says, "We must entrench the Church of God's presence in *another* ninety countries!"

Pillay, Boyce, Zapata, and Pohsngap are cautiously optimistic about the possibilities. They pray for swift and decisive action as next steps are implemented. They anticipate solid leadership and clear direction. They look forward to the Spirit's blessing upon meetings that will represent the world's diverse locations and perspectives well, while fostering unity in Christ. They long to see just what the Lord can accomplish through a united Church of God.


