The Oregon and SW Washington Association was well represented, networking, reconnecting, and blessed with great





Text Subscribing to Prayer: An E-mail Ministry and the Man Behind It

Ding! Chirp! Buzz! Many of these sounds fly out of phones, tablets or laptops, announcing the latest e-mail to arrive in your inbox. Hundreds of thousands of e-mails are sent every day around the world for various reasons, such as business meetings, soccer games, or lunch outings with friends. David L. Coolidge regularly sends e-mails to more than 1,500 individual e -mail addresses across the Church of God. Many of the people who receive those e-mails forward them on to others, making it nearly impossible to know how many families Coolidge reaches. But why would someone go to the trouble of getting special permission from an Internet provider to send all of those e-mails? If you were to ask David Coolidge, it all comes down to one thing: prayer.

After serving the Lord for more than forty years as a pastor for youth, music and worship ministry, and visitation and pastoral care, David and his wife retired

from their staff ministry positions in 1999. Coolidge admitted that adjusting to retirement, especially in the beginning, was difficult. "There were times when I greatly missed former pastoral duties and responsibilities, and other moments when I felt I was only an observer on the sidelines of the playing field of life. I longed for a renewed sense of purpose in my life and a new focus in my vocation as a minister."

The Lord, knowing the desires of David's heart, created a turning point in his life in the spring of 2000 when close friend and colleague at Park Place Church, Anita Smith Womack, fell ill. David Coolidge visited Anita and her husband in the hospital frequently, and felt led to send e-mail updates on her condition to various friends near and far. Many of those recipients expressed gratitude for the e-mails, and after Anita's passing, more recipients began to ask to be added to the prayer mailing list.

This was the beginning of the now-widespread e-mail prayer ministry. Prompted by the Lord, David Coolidge was soon sharing updates on births, weddings, special events, illness/surgery, accidents, deaths, and any other concerns of people in or related to Park Place Church of God, Anderson University, and other communities across the Church of God.

David even takes the time to research and include the family information for recipients so that everyone who receives the prayer request can relate to each other more personally—or perhaps realize that they are acquainted with that person's relatives or extended family members—bringing more unity to the body of Christ. In times of death, David tries to personally contact the grieving family to express condolences and obtain family information, as well as the times and dates for the visitation and service to include in his e-mails. The ministry has also expanded to not just e-mails, but also to sending sympathy, anniversary and birthday cards, e-cards, and Facebook messages.

David Coolidge has discovered over the past fifteen years of this ministry that the subject individuals of the e-mails and prayer requests are deeply grateful for the support, and often receive more e-mails from others who are a part of the e-mail prayer ministry for encouragement. When asked about how important prayer is to his personal faith, David Coolidge replied, "I strongly believe in the power of intercessory prayer, and prayer is very important to my personal faith."

This e-mail prayer ministry has made an impact on the community as "an important vehicle of communication for them to learn about the needs and concerns of persons they might not know about otherwise, and provides the opportunity for them to pray for and communicate directly with the persons for whom prayer has been requested, and taking advantage of the opportunity to request prayer by many fellow members of the family of God when desired/needed for themselves."

Empty Pew Project

The Empty Pew Project, a new ministry opportunity developed by North Avenue Church of God in Battle Creek, Michigan, was created to give members the opportunity to serve in their community instead of simply sitting in church every week. The Empty Pew

community instead of simply sitting in church every week. The Empty Pew Project defied the negative connotations associated with empty pews and instead transformed this negative image into an incredibly positive and engaging ministry event.

The lead pastor at North Avenue, Jeff Eckman, addressed the idea behind the event, saying "We believe that emptying the pews for the right reason, and with the right motives, is actually a fulfillment of the Great Commandment, and exactly what Jesus would want us to do. We all hear people outside of the body of Christ criticize the church for being ingrown, selfish, hypocritical, and focused on money. Our goal was to show them a different image of the church. One that is more Christ-like. One that is here to serve."



Led by a sermon series on Matthew 20:26–28—a passage that encourages Christians to follow Jesus and serve others just as he did—The Empty Pew Project was a weeklong service opportunity at the end of May for

New Book from Warner Press Explains Events in the Middle East

to Engaging the

Muslim World

At Church of God Convention in June, Warner Press released a timely new book by cross-cultural missionary Patrick Nachtigall. Titled *Facing Islam*

without Fear, the book covers the dramatic changes occurring in the Middle East and argues that Christians cannot live in fear of the upheaval occurring in the Islamic world.

The news media has become a very poor source for understanding the complexity of the Islamic world. "Most of us who have traveled, worked, or lived extensively in the Islamic world are struck by the friendliness of the people, their knowledge of politics and history, and the intellectual sophistication of many of the people we meet," Nachtigall writes. The book breaks through the misinformation and simplistic analysis found in the media, but

also forcefully argues in-depth that the rise of Islamic extremism indicates that Islam itself is in upheaval.

"Many of these troubles stem from Islam's tension with secular political order and the modern world," he notes. "We are not witnessing a 'clash of civilizations' as much as we are witnessing a clash within a civilization that is spilling out globally."

In Facing Islam without Fear, Nachtigall introduces the basics of the Islamic faith, explains the underlying reasons for Islam's current instability, and

does not shy away from the militancy found in many forms of Islam. He discusses geo-political tensions, the terrorist threat, and Christian revivals breaking out. The book prepares Christians to engage Muslims—free of stereotypes, but with a realistic view of how Christianity differs from Islam.

A graduate of Anderson University and Yale University, Patrick Nachtigall is an emerging authority on the impact of globalization upon Christianity. His previous books on this subject include Passport of Faith (Warner Press: 2006) and Faith in the Future (Warner Press: 2008). He has traveled to more than seventy countries, lived on four continents, and his work over the past fifteen years has been based in the Middle East, Asia, and Europe.

Rev. Grant Fall receives title of Pastor Emeritus

The Oak Park Church of God in Salem, Oregon, bestowed upon Rev. Grant Fall the title of Pastor Emeritus. The celebration took place during the morning worship service of May 24, just prior to Grant's 80th birthday, and was attended by a number of Grant's family and friends, including three of his daughters and their families. A potluck luncheon followed the event.

Rev. Grant E. Fall was born and raised in the state of Washington. He accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior at age 20 while serving in the United States Marine Corps. A couple of years later in 1957, Grant felt God calling him into ministry while attending a youth camp at Mt. Palomar, California. While in California, Grant began attending the First Church of God in Oceanside, California where he met and married Margaret. Four of their five daughters (Janelle, Janine, Jackie and Joy) were born in California. Grant served as the Youth Pastor in Oceanside, California from 1960 to 1966.

In 1966 Grant began 10 years of ministry as Senior Pastor at the First Church of God in Klamath Falls, Oregon. During Grant's time of ministry at Klamath Falls, he was ordained in 1968 at the Oregon State Campmeeting. Daughter Jill joined the family in Klamath Falls.

In 1976 Grant and Margaret moved to Salem, Oregon where he served 11 years as Senior Pastor at the Oak Park Church of God. Grant's ministry also extended beyond the local level. During 8 of the 11 years in Salem, Grant served as the Chair of the Association of the Churches of God in Oregon and SW Washington. He served 11 years on the Board of Trustees for Warner Pacific College starting first during his pastorate in Salem, and continuing during a couple of his later pastorates in the Northwest.

From Salem, Grant and Margaret moved to Anchorage, Alaska for two years where Grant served as Senior Pastor at the Cornerstone Church of God. In 1989 they found their way back to Oregon and

pastored the First Church of God in Medford, for six years. 1995 found Grant and Margaret moving to Edmonds, Washington where for seven years he continued serving as a Senior Pastor. While in Edmonds, Grant served as Chair of the Washington Credentials Board and Chair of the Pacific Northwest Association of the Church of God.

At the age of 67 when some people choose retirement, Grant continued in ministry for another 12 years as an Associate Pastor. First he served four years in Klamath Falls, Oregon and then eight years in Salem at Oak Park Church of God. Grant will never fully retire from ministry as he is constantly looking for ways to love, encourage and serve people. We commend his dedication to faithfully serve God in the pastoral ministry his whole adult life.

For 46 years of ordained ministry and 54 years total of vocational ministry, we hereby bestow upon Rev. Grant E. Fall the title of Pastor Emeritus at Oak Park Church of God, Salem, Oregon.

members of the congregation to engage in various acts of service at several local organizations. From weeding and yard work, to tying quilts and sorting clothes, North Avenue benefited their community in deliberate and enjoyable ways that engaged those outside the church and hand-delivered the gospel message to them.

Though the project was primarily focused on serving and assisting people outside of the church, the reaches of its influence extended inwardly, as well, blessing the members of the congregation themselves and drawing them closer together in a beautiful display of unity and cooperation. Pastor Eckman testified to this unity, saying, "The most encouraging thing to me was the way that everyone worked together. The youth were working alongside some of our elderly, and families with kids were doing projects together. We also had one family that visited the church after recently moving into the area during the series. They immediately got on board and, after only being here two Sundays, they worked with us and built immediate connections to the church."

As Pastor Eckman told of the more than one hundred pairs of dirty, muddy shoes sitting outside the doors of the church during The Empty Pew Project's conclusory celebration service, I was reminded of one of Jesus' final acts of service: the washing of his disciples' feet. Just as Jesus humbled himself and washed the feet of those he came to save, so too North Avenue Church humbled themselves as a congregation and served the community that surrounded them.

The Empty Pew Project not only defied the stereotypically negative connotations associated with empty pews, it achieved a nearly opposing mindset that actually encouraged the emptying of pews in order to effectively minister as Jesus did. Whether washing one's feet or clearing brush in a local park, North Avenue discovered the blessing of service and the ability it has to spread the gospel in the name of Jesus.
