

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## Former WPC President Sworn in as Mayor of Seaside, Oregon

Building on a life dedicated to serving others, Rev. Dr. Jay Barber '64, President Emeritus of Warner Pacific College, is taking on another leadership role as the newly appointed mayor of the coastal town of Seaside, Oregon.

On Monday, December 5, Barber was sworn in as mayor, filling the unexpired term of



former mayor Don Larson, who recently passed away. Barber and his wife Jan moved to the north coastal town in 2006 and three years later he became involved in the Seaside City Council. Barber's previous political experience includes serving as a city councilor and two-term mayor in Red Bluff, California.

In 1996, Barber became Warner Pacific's sixth president. When interviewed by the search committee, he said one of the first things he wanted to do as the College President was reinstate intercollegiate athletics, which had been discontinued in 1993. "It's such an important part of the fabric of the campus," he claimed. Three years later, Barber saw Warner Pacific Knights in action on the field and court. The continued growth and development of Knights Athletics is just one example of Barber's rich legacy at the College.

During his 12 years of leadership, Warner Pacific became debt free for the first time in its history, enrollment increased dramatically, and the College's reputation was solidified. On May 30, 2008, Barber retired; however, he didn't slow down. Sharing his strong leadership, fundraising, and strategic planning skills, Barber was appointed the

first Senior Fellow with the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust in 2008. He also served as a director and two years as chair of the Board of Directors of Mercy Corps, a relief and disaster organization based in Portland. And recently served as the interim Teaching Pastor for the 3,000 member Sunset Presbyterian Church in Beaverton.

"Jay Barber lives a life that truly exemplifies the motto of Warner Pacific College, 'Where faith and scholarship lead to service,'" said President Andrea Cook. "We are honored to be part of his story and we are grateful for his continued friendship. We wish him all the best and we are confident that the City of Seaside will be blessed by his strategic leadership."

### Look to the Hills: Camp White Branch Sees Snowfall

The first 15" of snow looks great at Camp White Branch, near McKenzie Bridge, OR, where Leonard Meyer will be plowing, keeping pipes from freezing, and staying safe this winter.

"It is not easy living in the snow that deep," Mel Neu says, noting that Leonard had to go to town for more 2x4's and 2x6's; with seven ceiling joists yet to put in place, then the bracing and the framing for light openings.

Now the light fixtures are hung in the upper rooms and ready for the electrician to finish the roughed-in wiring. The ceiling joists are up on the wall plates. Half of them are in place and screwed down.

"We hired a couple high school boys to help us bring them into the building and set in place," says Neu. The joists weigh about 100 pounds and are 24 feet long. They were bulky and hard to manage with just two people. "Sure glad Leonard and Stacey are liked in this community and can get help," says Neu. "We would have had a much harder time in getting them up. Next week we will get them all fastened down and braced and light fixtures hung. Thank you for the financial help to buy them. One more thing soon done."

"I hope to be done for the winter up here," Mel adds on a personal

note. "My car just does not like this much snow, nor do I."

"Seems [Leonard] was always plowing the roads open," says Mel, with appreciation, "I realize now what the caretakers have had to do up there in the winter."

## **Longtime Missionary Turns 100**

1916. That was the year former missionary Ernest LaFont was born. Well-known across the movement throughout the 20th century, he and his wife Grace were regarded by both pastors and laypeople, at home and abroad, as exemplary pillars of the faith. Chances are pretty good that either you are someone who was blessed by the ministry of the LaFonts, or you know someone who was. From Panama to Egypt, to Lebanon and finally Washington State, the widespread reach of this Pacific Bible College (now Warner Pacific) graduate over the span of a lifetime has not ceased, but continues to this day. Family member and friend Bob Moss of Church of God Ministries knows firsthand the incredible impact of Ernest LaFont on the movement, and is honored to offer just a glimpse of the harrowing circumstances that shaped this man of God.

Two times Ernest and Grace LaFont lost everything. But they didn't lose *everything*. Before the days of mass transit by air, it wasn't uncommon for missionaries to reach their destination by sea. It was the era of the Skaggs and the Albrechts, the LaFonts were aboard

the Andrea Doria en route to the United States for home assignment from Egypt. But when their ship collided with a Swedish liner known as the Stockholm, they had to be rescued. Ernest, Grace, and son Leland lost all their earthly possessions except the clothes on their backs and, thankfully, the passport in Daddy's pocket. Remarkably, their faith and their peace were still intact.

That was 1956. While serving in Lebanon in 1975, it happened again. War broke out, forcing the LaFonts to flee during the night in an American embassy vehicle. Thankfully they escaped harm, but were only able to take one suitcase each. Based on conversation with Ernest over the years, Bob Moss beams when he thinks of the missionary couple's amazing resilience to difficult life circumstances.

"Ernie, and Grace [now deceased], had an amazing sense of humor," Bob explains. "They had the ability to laugh in the midst of where most of us would be in peril. During the war in Lebanon, a bomb went off nearby and cut the power to their home. They had agreed beforehand that, in case of emergency, they would meet in a certain safe place in the house. In the dark, the two of them got on their hands and knees and crawled from different places to meet. They couldn't see and, in the dark, banged their heads into each other, but fell over on the floor, laughing the whole time! I can easily see them doing that because that's just the kind of people they were."

Ernest could appropriately be described as a legacy missionary. Though he has accomplished much by the grace and power of God, he doesn't feel he's arrived by any means. Following his years as a missionary, he served Washington State as area administrator for several years. He then became the pastoral care pastor at First Church of God in Walla Walla, Washington (following his brother, Frank LaFont, a 28-year missionary to Africa, who preceded him in that role). Retirement is not in Ernest's vocabulary, as even today he continues a ministry of prayer and sending cards to those in his home congregation of First Church, now known as Blue Mountain Community Church. To this day, he continues to impart wisdom and raise the bar of Christ-like

excellence to everyone with whom he has contact. Bob Moss is one of those persons. When asked about one thing about Ernest's life and witness that has made a lasting impression, he cites two.

"First, he taught me the perspective of being a citizen of heaven on earthly assignment. Material things weren't the focus of their lives. That's how they were able to take their material losses in stride. Second, they truly lived as international people and had a wide group of loyal friends from Egypt and Lebanon and, as a result, they helped me begin thinking more globally as a pastor. When you're truly international, you begin to see the world in a larger scope than just your American lens. In my own travels to the Middle East, the older saints still speak in reverential tones about Ernest and Grace. He is the embodiment of what Paul said in Philippians 4 about being content in all circumstances. Even now, in assisted living, he is content. 'I have everything I need,' he says."

# Church of God Convention 2017 Host Church a Hub for the Community By Carl Stagner (posted by chogministries)

"I have never been more excited than I am now about how God is moving the Church of God into a bright future!" Sounds like something the general director of Church of God Ministries might say. Or a member of the Ministries Council. Maybe even someone applying for a leadership position in the General Assembly. But these words come from the pastor of one of our most influential churches in the movement: Bob Beckler, of Central Community Church in Wichita, Kansas. The Wichita congregation will host what is shaping up to be a must-attend Church of God Convention in June 2017. Before you go, get to know this 110-year-old church whose vitality and drive for ministry is nothing short of contagious.

These are motivated saints. And they have good reason to be. While many churches find themselves in the declining stage of their life cycle a century later, the Spirit is continually pouring new life into Central Community. "We are a church on the move," Pastor Bob explains. "We feel very clearly that God

has visited us and has said it's time to move forward. Over the last eight or nine months, based on the book of Habakkuk, we've been in what we call the "Right the Vision"

campaign—like the watchman on the wall, clearly communicating what God is doing. We've formed multiple teams, we've come up with a new vision and mission statement. We're planning what we're going to do with the forty acres we have. God is moving and it's powerful."

When asked what has contributed to the church's health and vitality, Bob explains that Central Community Church has long been a leader in its community. It's not just a fixture in the community; it's a hub of activity for the community. He also insists that Central Community has long been a force for good in the Church of God movement and around the world. "Even though there may have been some 'classroom' seasons that God has taken us through, there has always been this fact that God is using this place to lead our community and world to reconcile

with those who do not know Jesus. Right now, more than 30 percent of the congregation has been here less than two years, and forty percent less than four years. We have begun the ministry of reconciliation, and that has led to unbelievable restoration. People keep coming to see what God is doing in a church that is actively being restored."

The name of their church is so fitting for what they

do. As a central gathering place, they now host extravagant Christmas and Easter productions attended by thousands of locals. Pastor George Skramstad is back at the church where he led so many years in worship, and now he's helping to revitalize the grand-scale choral, worship arts aspects of what they do.

As a hub for the community, they're keeping the facilities in tip-top shape. But before the new coat of paint, the congregation wrote more than 1,300 scriptures on the walls to symbolize the power of God in what they're doing there. But these believers don't just stay on the church property. Through an effort known as The Dollar Club, each month they're taking funds raised out to the needy to pay for gas or electric bills, offering financial assistance to families of prisoners, surprising police officers with gifts, and much more. The church video records the acts of kindness and shows the entire congregation what their dollars can do. This only motivates the church to give more, and the cycle of being Jesus to the community continues. "Know Christ and Make Him Known"—from providing family-friendly activities at the church, to local and international missions, everything Central Community Church does stems from that new Jesus-centered mission statement.

Pastor Bob and Central Community Church can't wait to see brothers and sisters in Christ from across the country and around the world gather in Wichita next June. As they roll out the welcome mat, they also recommend a few eateries: Freddy's, an old-fashioned hamburger establishment, as well as a variety of great barbecue places in Old Town

Five sponsored children's homes were severely damaged or destroyed. \*The following children's families are unable to live in their homes. The estimated costs of replacing or repairing the homes is included:

- Alexander Bone ECT-001 home is a total loss \$300
- Bryon Zambrano ECT-005 Home is a total loss \$500
- Mercedes Guagua ECT-007 Pillars cracked and falling. 2 walls gone - \$150
- Dayana Bazurto ECT-020 -Home is a total loss \$400
- Samuel Charoz ECT-023 Home is a total loss \$600

#### Arthur Raymond Eikamp

(9/23/1918-11/8/2016)

A memorial service was held for Arthur Raymond Eikamp, 98, of Bandon, OR, Saturday, Dec. 3, at the Langlois Community Church.

Arthur was born Sept. 23, 1918, in a newly built chicken coop on a farm in Gary, S.D., the son of John and Anna (Beving) Eikamp. He was the fifth and last surviving of six children: four sisters and one brother.

Growing up in the dust bowl years, Arthur learned frugality, ingenuity, and self-sacrificing (if you couldn't make it, you did without it), and strong work and moral ethics from his devout Christian parents. After a life changing experience in his late teens he enrolled in Anderson College to study for the ministry. There he made life-lasting friendships, but it wasn't until he was a student at Yale Divinity School that he met and married Norma Helen Blewitt from New York City.

The first two years of married life they lived out of a Jeep station wagon traveling from Minnesota to the Rio Grande Valley ministering to agricultural migrants and their families. In 1949 they received the call to go to Japan to help the Japanese church rebuild after the devastation of World War II and embark on a 35-year missionary career in that country. They had the privilege of seeing Japan rise from the ashes and rubble of defeat and U.S. military occupation to become the advanced nation that it is today. In 1984, before retiring from serving in Japan, Arthur was honored by Emperor Hirohito with a medal for extended service to the Japanese people.

After returning to the U.S. Arthur taught at Warner Pacific College in Portland, Ore., for two years. He then embarked on the adventure of building his own home in Langlois. They moved into the still unfinished house in 1987 and enjoyed working on the house, cutting trees and chopping firewood. Most of all he enjoyed teaching adult Bible class in church. About that time he decided to write his memoir and published the book "Sensei" in 2000.

Serving God in any place and at any time was Arthur's purpose in life and his greatest joy. His closest ties to the community and friends came through the church.

Arthur is survived by Norma, his wife of 69 years; son, Daniel Eikamp, in Japan; five grandchildren, numerous nieces and nephews, including Roy Eikamp and his family of Bandon. He was preceded in death by his oldest son, Mark in 2009.
