Marva Adams will lead worship for the convention. Marva is a familiar face in the district. She lives in Hillsboro with her





It's not just about having the right information



In last month's newsletter article, I shared about our need as an Association to recapture our calling to become disciples of Jesus. If we want to be

effective in our mission to make more disciples, we have to be prepared to go into our communities with the right agenda.

The first question we must ask is *what does it mean* to be a disciple of Jesus? The word disciple, according to dictionary.com, simply means a follower or a student or apprentice of another. We are all disciples of someone, and we need to ask ourselves, whose disciple are we?.

Dallas Willard, in his book *The Divine Conspiracy,* says, "One thing is sure: you are somebody's disciple. You learned how to live from somebody else. There are no exceptions to this rule, for human beings are just the kind of creatures that have to learn and keep learning from others how to live." He goes on to say, "this is hard for us to come to terms with especially in a Western culture that prides itself on thinking we are 'our own person' and we are the master of our own destiny."

The truth is, from birth to death we are learning to understand and navigate our way in the world by others. We are the disciple of many "somebodies" including our parents, teachers, coworkers, friends, the media, music, our church and, hopefully, somewhere on that list, Jesus. The problem is, Jesus doesn't want to be one of several influencers in your life. He wants to be our Lord! The call of Jesus to be his disciple is a simple one; He says, "follow me".

David Platt in his book, *Follow Me*, Says, "Four fishermen stood by a sea in the first century when Jesus approached them. 'Follow me,' He said, 'and I

will make you fishers of men.' (Matthew 4:19). With that, Jesus beckoned these men to leave behind their professions, possessions, dreams, ambitions, family, friends, safety, and security. He bid them to abandon everything."

"If anyone is going to follow me, he must deny himself," Jesus would say many times. That is still the call for us, to put aside all other influence and to follow Him. To be a disciple of Jesus according to Willard means, "that you have decided to be with another person, under appropriate conditions, in order to become capable of doing what that person does or to become what that person is..."

Another important way of putting this is to say that I am learning from Jesus to live my life as He would live my life if He were I. I am not necessarily learning to do everything He did, but I am learning how to do everything I do in the manner that He did all that He did.

At some point we have lost sight of the call to total abandonment to Jesus in favor of a casual association with Christ. According to Pratt, "Scores of men, women, and children have been told that becoming a follower of Jesus simply involves acknowledging certain facts or saying certain words, but this is not true."

Becoming a true disciple of Jesus is a call to get off the throne of our lives and to make Jesus our Lord. It's not just about having all the right information, because to truly believe that Jesus is Lord is to do what he says. I've seen too many "Christians" who acknowledge Jesus with their mouth but deny him with their life.

The first step in becoming a true disciple of Jesus is to do what Jesus said in Matthew 16:24: "Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must **deny** themselves and take up their cross and follow me'."

We must die to ourselves, our will and our ambition and make Jesus the subject of our life. Jesus says follow me and....

WPC becomes Warner Pacific University, reduces tuition Church of God Ministries

Warner Pacific College in southeast Portland announced a name change to Warner Pacific University, at an event held January 18. The new name more accurately reflects the growth and development that Warner Pacific has experienced in recent years. Additionally, they announced a drastic tuition reduction of 23%.

"The word *university* reflects a new era at Warner Pacific," says President Andrea P. Cook. "It better encompasses the scope of the programs we now offer and the scale of what our graduates are achieving. Our students, as well as our faculty and staff, have earned our place in this sphere and we know it's where we belong."

The change recognizes increased academic programs at both the undergraduate and graduate level. Becoming Warner Pacific University will also clarify the position of the institution to international students and those whose language of origin is not English, where the word *college* often refers to high school or secondary level education.

Established as Pacific Bible College in 1937 by the Church of God (Anderson, Indiana) in Spokane, Washington, this is not the first major identity change for the institution. The school moved to Portland in 1940 and became Warner Pacific College in 1959. For nearly a decade, Warner Pacific has been recognized for a commitment to diversity in higher education, with 63 percent of students coming from racially and ethnically diverse backgrounds.

Warner Pacific University serves undergraduate and graduate students at campuses throughout Portland and southwest Washington, as well as online. The University offers over thirty career-focused majors that prepare students with the confidence and skills they need to use their education to make a difference for their family and their community.

A 23-percent tuition cut

Warner Pacific University is reducing tuition by nearly 24 percent starting in the fall of 2018, in an effort to provide equitable access to private higher education, the university announced on Thursday. Tuition and fees for the 2017-18 academic year were \$24,500. Beginning in fall semester, tuition and fees will be \$18,660, making Warner Pacific the most affordable private college or university in Oregon.

"We are committed to providing educational access to students from diverse backgrounds, especially those from lower socioeconomic backgrounds," said President Andrea P. Cook. "Many of our students need to balance their college experience with work, life, and family responsibilities. As a Christ-centered university, we believe in equal access to education for all. For us, this is more than a justice issue, it's a *Jesus* issue."

Known for a commitment to equitable access to higher education, Warner Pacific offers a unique learning environment in the state of Oregon, with 63 percent of students coming from racially and ethnically diverse backgrounds. This year, 57 percent of the student body are the first in their families to attend college.

Simply put, this nearly \$6,000 reduction in tuition means more students will be able to enroll at Warner Pacific and finish their college education while accumulating less debt.


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The tuition decrease is accompanied by a reconfiguration of financial aid, providing a savings for many new and continuing students, as there will be a reduced reliance of unsubsidized parent loans and private student loans.

"By itself, lowering our tuition price isn't enough," says Cook. "Our commitment to being a Christ-centered, urban, liberal arts institution—focused on giving students from diverse backgrounds an education that prepares them to engage in a changing world—demands we do all we can to serve as many as we can. We must provide adequate preparation for the careers that are in demand after they leave Warner Pacific."

Reflecting their desire to be "...in the city, for the city," Warner Pacific has been meeting with leaders throughout Portland in fields of healthcare, technology, criminal justice, and more, in an effort to better understand the workforce needs in this region.

In 2018, Warner Pacific is launching new programs that give practical focus to the liberal arts, including medical lab science, nursing, digital media and communications, criminal justice, sports medicine, population health, and gerontology. Master's level programs in education and business administration will develop leaders in these key fields who will serve with passion and integrity.

Resources Available to Local Congregations

Our Association exists in large part to assist local congregations in carrying out their ministries. In that regard we want to make you aware of two available resources.

First, is *TechSoup.org* – an organization which receives donations of software from a number of the major companies (Microsoft, Intuit, Adobe, etc.) for the purpose of re-distributing to non-profits at greatly discounted prices. Three of their offerings you might be interested in are: Microsoft Office Pro (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Publisher, and Access which retails for over \$300) is only \$40. QuickBooks Pro (retail \$200) is \$50, and Adobe Creative Cloud (Photoshop, Illustrator, InDesign, and Adobe XD, 1 yr subscription at \$620) is \$5 plus \$20/month paid to Adobe.

To become eligible you simply complete documentation on TechSoup's site demonstrating your status as a nonprofit and once approved, select the software you desire and pay with a credit card, and download the software.

As a side note, should your budget be even more challenged... explore these two open-source (free) software packages. The first is OpenOffice which is a clone of the Microsoft Office suite (available at OpenOffice.org). It reads & writes all MS Office document formats. And secondly, GIMP (at gimp.org) is an image editor similar to PhotoShop or Illustrator. Both come with good documentation and community support.

Second, the Association Treasurer, Steve Robertson, has made himself available as a no-cost resource to congregations needing assistance in planning, design, training, and implementation in the areas of church accounting, website design and implementation, and email newsletter communication. Call or email the Association office to make use of this resource.

The conference is geared for couples in recovery from betrayal in their marriages. Featured speakers and schedule details will be emailed to district churches in the next few weeks.



He is survived by his wife Joan Johnson of Vancouver, WA, sister Ann O'Keefe of Powell Butte, OR, daughter Bonnie Rees of Gig Harbor, WA, sons Jeff Johnson of Austin, TX, Paul Johnson of Auburn, WA, and Matthew Johnson of McMinnville, OR, as well as many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. His life will be remembered and celebrated at Vancouver Church (3300 NE 78th St, Vancouver, WA) on Sunday, February 25, at 3:00 PM.
