Paul Sparks is a Community Organizer and Social Entrepreneur. His place-based expertise and trusted friendships in neighborhoods across North America make him an indispensable consultant to community organizations, academic institutions, and faith-based groups. Paul is the co-founding instructor for the innovative Leadership in the New Parish Certificate at the Seattle School of Psychology and Theology. He lives in Tacoma with his wife Elizabeth.

Tim Soerens is a social entrepreneur and co-founding director of the Parish Collective. As co-director of the Parish Collective, he convenes ministry leaders, teaches, and consults with organizations seeking human flourishing in particular neighborhoods while also working
